We have had uncertain times this year given the long-term absence of Mr Bridge and we have also had to say 'good-bye' to some of our temporary staff. The inspectors agreed that the school should retain its 'Good' judgement. The leadership team are working with staff and the Local Authority to make significant changes, many of which will be in place in September.

We have had many successes to celebrate this year, especially our recent victory at the 'Well-Being Challenge' Awards ceremony where we won the award for service design. Last half term we focused our English learning on spellings, sentence structure and reading 'The Twits' and looking at features within the book such as descriptions of Mr Twits beard and use of similes; we have even written some of our own similes.

The boys have also been working hard towards their Duke of Edinburgh award and their Princes Trust. Lots of activities were out of the boy's comfort zone but they worked really well and helped each other. Of course, it hasn't all been hard work!



English Mr Swarbrick & Mrs Woods

Key Stage 3 classes have focussed on The Lord of the Rings this term. We found the film to be an excellent resource for character and setting analysis as well as an excellent example of a Fantasy story.

We created our own short quests and designed our own power item, similar to the ring in the film. We designed our own fantasy maps and our own fantasy creatures, similar to the Orcs in the film.

If any children wanted to develop their understanding further, they can access all three Lord of the Rings films on Netflix.

Year 10 have been working towards their GCSE qualification and Entry Level Certificate. The focus this term has been on Blood Brothers and Romeo and Juliet. I have been very impressed with the effort that has gone into the portfolios.

Both year groups showed maturity when learning about the different social classes in Blood Brothers. They developed a wonderful understanding of Liverpool in the '60s and '70s and were able to actively participate in nature vs nurture debate. We tackled exam-style questions together and independently.

Romeo and Juliet provided all pupils with an insight into the Shakespearian language. Although confused at the start, children were able to follow the unfamiliar vocabulary alongside the plot really well. All pupils analysed characters and settings and also attempted exam-style questions related to the play.

Maths

Mr Cameron and Miss Brown

Recently we have been studying what is usually everyone's most feared aspect of maths – ALGEBRA! Everyone has been trying so hard and have realised that it needn't be feared after all.

We've had some amazingly dedicated 'algebragicians'. **Mason** and **Charlie** have tackled every task so far. **Tyler** and **George** have been teaching what they know to Ms Beattie, and **Calum** and **Tegan** have shown their expertise with Pythagoras' Theorem.

We spent some lessons using isometric drawing paper; the challenge was to draw their name or initials using squared paper first, and then represent it as 3D blocks, we were so impressed with some of the results, we made a whole display!

Well done in particular to **Poppy**, **Khalim**, **Lucas**, **George** and **Shay**.



KS3 have been looking at forces, speed and acceleration in our Physics lessons. We built our own mini rockets which we then launched on the school fields, some travelled so far, they were never seen again!

In Biology, we have learnt about the digestive system and health and lifestyle, the pupils were amazed at the chemicals found in cigarettes which included; *nicotine* (*insecticide*), stearic acid (candlewax) and ammonia (toilet cleaner).

Science Mr Morris & Mrs Watson

KS4 Biology has focused on the nervous system, genetics, evolution, pollution and the environment. During practical lessons, they have dissected pig's heart. We used a banana for DNA extraction and observed the results under the microscope. Did you know that 50% of human DNA is the same as a banana?

Humanities Mrs Moran & Miss Ramsey

We have been studying a Religious Education unit on Life and Death as well as one on Development and India, including a look at the Hindu belief in reincarnation as well the beliefs of other religions in Heaven and Hell.

Pupils had discussions on what they believed happened after death with some deciding nothing and others thinking they will go to heaven or come back as something else. When asked if they could be reincarnated as anything that would that be, we had answers ranging from a police dog to a superhero. Nice that most pupils wanted to come back as something that would help others.

Pupils studied India's different regions and climate, about the many poor and the few rich. They studied shanty towns in more depth and even tried to create their own model dwelling from rubbish just like the poor of India. They then studied tourism in India along with the pros and cons of this for the local communities and what could be done to make it better and more sustainable.

Towards the end of the last term, we had started studying World War Two which we will finish off next term along with studying the Holocaust and more contemporary global issues.











Design Technology Mr Ramsden & Mr Wilson


Key stage 3 have produced three artefacts this year.

The first product we made was a Gumball machine which focused on traditional woodworking skills and the use of jigs to ensure accuracy. As you can see the results speak for themselves.

The second project was concerned with the accuracy of marking out, the accuracy of cutting and the use of machines to produce a high-quality product out of wood and acrylic.

We had some very accurate results.

The third project was concerned with making things in multiple. The brief was to design and make a template to manufacture more than one mobile phone holder that could be made cheaply enough to be included with a letter or greeting card and sent to a friend or friends. There were a lot of design constraints which to think about which limited what you could design. We had some fantastic results.



In June we had a visit to the department by The Careers and Enterprise Company who ran two workshops related to the world of work in the construction industries.

The first workshop dealt with the different careers and what to expect from them and the second was more hands-on where experts from Wickes came and built a pair of picnic benches.

Needless to say, all the pupils and staff had two very interesting, and busy, days.

Food Technology Mrs Sudworth & Mrs Beattie



The Year 11's had been completing their final controlled assessment towards their Level 2 BTEC in Home Cooking Skills before they leave in June.

Key Stage 3 pupils have been studying healthy alternatives to takeaway foods and planning and testing healthy school meals to be introduced into the current school menu. Some of the healthy alternatives have been challenging for some pupils. Especially adding dates to a chocolate brownie recipe to give natural sweetness and moisture!

This year KS3 pupils have taken part in Swimming, Trampoline, Football Athletics, Badminton, Cricket Archery and Handball.

Year 7,8 and 9 have settled really well into the PE routine demonstrating lots of talent and ability. The bigger groups mean that we have been able to play games with realistic team sizes providing lots of challenging opportunities.

Forest School

Our Activate visits to Forest School in the Easter term were eventful, we had some sunny days where we were able to sunbathe and enjoy the calm of the forest and then we had some very wet and cold days which led to us being huddled under the canopy with the fire lit.

We have learnt how to make drop scones, nettles in the batter to eat and making our own dough to make bread. Some pupils have tried to make a rope swing, with varying success, one attempt left one pupil with multiple nettle stings, but they will live and learn.

We have continued to learn skills with the knives and the axes etc. The lovely Meg (dog) has joined us on some of our visits and the pupils thoroughly enjoy their time with her.

Bilal has shown lots of determination in making a model of the solar system out of wooden discs which he cut from logs, considering the size needed before painting them and eventually displaying them.

Our weekly visit to Forest School on our Activate programme during the Summer term is always a pleasure.

The pupils have the freedom of the forest to explore, as well as learning new independence skills. Most pupils have volunteered to get the fire started, using only a 'flint and steel'. We then rely on teamwork to chop the wood and attend to the fire, so we can boil the kettle or do some cooking on the open fire.

Some pupils also learnt how to make their own Swedish torch using the axe, knife, mallet and drill before lighting it. During the high winds, we spent the day at Bowley campsite where the pupils had a go at making bread inside the teepee. Other cooking skills learnt have been cooking sausages, burgers, drop scones and wild garlic fritters. Some days the pupils put up the hammocks and spent some time chatting or simply relaxing listening to the birds and the river.

We are looking forward to better weather and to continue learning the Activate skills of Compassion, Ambition, Perseverance, Teamwork, Self-Control and Self Honesty.



Summer Holiday Horrors – Just don't do it

Fire Safety

Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service is gearing up for the Summer Holidays that are approaching and with warm, sunny weather hopefully accompanying the school holidays it is bracing itself for a possible increase in nuisance fires.

With this in mind parents are being urged to try and keep a track on where their children are and what they are up to. Unfortunately the majority of the nuisance fires are caused deliberately by young people and what may start out as a 'bit of a laugh' could result in serious consequences.



We would like to remind parents that it is important to spell out the dangers of deliberate fire setting to children and make them aware that arson is a serious criminal offence. The Police are working with the Fire service and will be issuing youth referral notices and carrying out home visits to these offenders

<u>Water Safety</u>

During the school holidays, and in particular in hot weather, increasing numbers of children put themselves at risk of drowning. On average 40-50 children drown per year in the UK. The only safe place to swim is in a swimming pool. Don't take the risk and swim in open water where it could be cold and you may get into difficulties. **You don't know what lies beneath.**
